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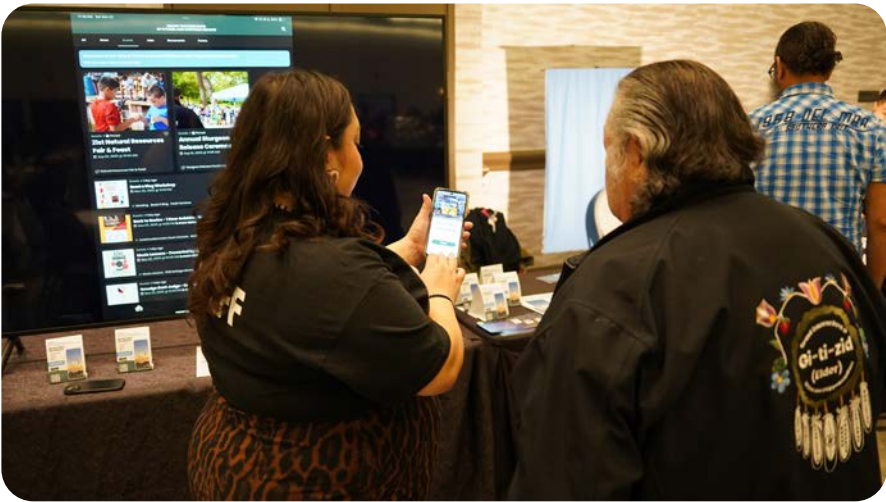

EDITOR'S LETTER

Aanii Tribal Membership & Community, My name is Victoria Alfonseca, and I am honored to serve as the Editor of GTB News and to oversee the communications of the Grand Traverse Band of Ottawa and Chippewa Indians. As a lifelong Peshawbestown resident and proud Tribal Member, this work is more than a job, it is a calling rooted in community, memory, and a deep responsibility to our people.

My journey with the Communications Department began when I was only 15 years old, juggling high school and the TBA Career Tech Center, where I studied graphic design. Those were the early days when I was still learning who I wanted to be. The turning point came when Editor Dave Spinniken welcomed me into the GTB Communications Department. Dave didn’t just give me work, he gave me confidence. He taught me how to communicate with clarity and compassion, how to serve with integrity, and how to always remember that the heart of our work is the people.

Dave’s mentorship stayed with me through my continued studies in business, marketing, and data analytics at NMC and Ferris State University. His recent passing has weighed heavily on many of us, and his obituary is included in this issue so we may honor his remarkable contributions. It is because of him that I entered this field, and it is because of him that I strive every day to give GTB my very best.

LISTENING TO OUR COMMUNITY, AND MOVING FORWARD TOGETHER

In recent years, I’ve spent a great deal of time listening to the voices of our membership: elders wanting more accessible information, families hoping for more timely updates, young adults asking for mobile access, and off-reservation members seeking better ways to stay connected. Every comment, request, and concern has shaped the direction of GTB Communications.

One of my biggest steps forward has been the launch of the new GTB Mobile App, created to make Tribal information available wherever you are. I want to reassure our elders and those who may feel unsure with technology: this app was designed to be simple, clear, and easy to use. And if you need help, we will support you, our goal is not to leave anyone behind, but to bring everyone closer.

- It helps reach Tribal Members living outside Michigan or those moving frequently.
- It ensures that no matter where you are, your community is only a click away.

We want to ensure that every elder, every household, and every member has a choice that fits their needs.

SERVICES & SUPPORT FOR TRIBAL MEMBERS

The Grand Traverse Band of Ottawa and Chippewa Indians (GTB) Housing Department is dedicated to helping Tribal Members secure safe, affordable, and stable housing. Whether you are renting, seeking homeownership, managing accessibility needs, or improving financial wellness. GTB Housing offers many programs to support individuals, families, Elders, and those in transition. Below is a full overview of available services, with direct links to applications and forms for easy access.

RENTAL SUPPORT & ASSISTANCE

NAHASDA Rental Subsidy Program

This program helps eligible GTB Tribal Members reduce their monthly rent payment. The subsidy is paid directly to the landlord — providing essential financial relief for families, Elders, and individuals working toward long-term stability. Housing Assistance for Low-Income & Market Rental Units

GTB Housing offers two pathways for rental assistance:

- Low-Income Housing Units, with rent based on income and household size.

DENTAL & HEALTH CLINIC



Winter has arrived across Kchi Wiikwedong, and as we gather with loved ones to celebrate the season, the GTB Dental Team extends warm wishes to all our Tribal Members. With cold and flu season moving quickly through our communities, we also want to take a moment to highlight National Hand Washing Awareness Week (December 1–7)—a simple but powerful reminder of how we can protect ourselves and each other. Hand washing is one of the easiest and most effective ways to combat germs, reduce illness, and keep our families healthy during the winter months. It’s especially important to wash your hands before touching your eyes, nose, or mouth, before eating, and after using the restroom. Small habits can make a big difference in keeping our community well.

- WHY HANDWASHING MATTERS
- ◆ Handwashing can prevent 1 in 3 diarrhea-related illnesses and 1 in 5 infections such as the flu and common cold, according to the CDC.
 - ◆ Every year, 1.4 million children under age 5 worldwide die from diarrheal diseases and pneumonia—the two most dangerous illnesses for young children.
 - ◆ Studies show only 31% of men and 65% of women wash their hands after using a public restroom.
 - ◆ Reducing the need for antibiotics helps lower antibiotic resistance. Handwashing is one of the key ways to prevent sickness so fewer antibiotics are needed.
 - ◆ A sneeze can travel 200 miles per hour, releasing around 40,000 droplets into the air—droplets that can easily spread germs. Proper handwashing helps stop those germs from being passed along.

REMEMBER, PROPER HANDWASHING TECHNIQUE

Hand washing steps

Wet your hands with clean, running water.

Apply soap and rub your hands together for at least 20 seconds.

Rinse your hands until all the soap is gone.

Turn off the faucet with a paper towel or your elbow.

Dry your hands with a clean paper towel or hand towel.

Reminding all patients that if you are being transported to an appointment that requires any type of anesthesia you will need to have someone with you for the pick-up and drop-off of the transport and during the procedure. This process will protect our patients and health staff should any issue or complication arise during or after the procedure.

- GTB PRC reminds all patients to update their applications for the new year! The GTB PRC program is for eligible GTB members as written below:
1. Must be a member of the Grand Traverse Band of Ottawa and Chippewa Indians.
 2. Must reside within the GTB PRC Delivery Area (PRCDA): Antrim, Benzie, Charlevoix, Grand Traverse, Leelanau, and Manistee counties and furnish documentation to substantiate residency eligibility for a minimum of 90 days prior to eligibility being established:
- Option 1-
- A copy of your GTB Photo Tribal ID, & valid driver’s license or State of Michigan photo ID with the physical address listed on the application and one of the following in your name:
- ◆ A current utility bill
 - ◆ A current bill received on a monthly basis
 - ◆ Most recent year form W2
 - ◆ Most recent year Federal Income tax return
 - ◆ Michigan Voter’s registration card
 - ◆ Current monthly bank statement
- Option 2-
- A copy of your GTB photo Tribal ID, and two of the following in your name:
- ◆ A current utility bill
 - ◆ A current bill received on a monthly basis
 - ◆ Most recent year form W2
 - ◆ Most recent year Federal Income tax return
 - ◆ Michigan Voter’s registration card
 - ◆ A current monthly bank statement

- Option 3-
- A copy of your GTB Photo Tribal ID or valid Driver’s License or Michigan ID, and:
- ◆ Fill out an Affidavit for Certification of Residency for Co-habitants Resident Tribal Member (affidavits can be requested by contacting the Membership department).
 - ◆ Please note if a GTB member is living in the six-county area and homeless, we will work with you to offer case management services to assist with your healthcare needs.
3. PRC needs to have a referral from a primary care provider on file to obtain a Pre-Authorization for specialized healthcare or dentalcare treatment plan.

ANNUAL MEDICARE PART B REIMBURSEMENT UPDATE

(Current Eligible Participants – 6-County Service Area Only) Tribal members already receiving Medicare Part B reimbursement must submit a copy of their Medicare Entitlement Statement each year, or when an update is received, to receive reimbursement without interruption.

- ◆ This statement arrives from Social Security at the beginning of January.
- ◆ It shows your Medicare coverage and premium amounts.
- ◆ **Deadline: Submit by January 31.**

If you need a replacement statement, call Social Security: 1-800-772-1213 or log in to your mySocial Security account.

A copy of your Medicare Entitlement Statements should be sent to the **Benefits Coordinator, David Wonegeshik**

TURNING 65? YOU MUST ENROLL IN MEDICARE

Tribal members approaching age 65 need to sign up for Medicare.

- ◆ Enroll during the 7-month window: 3 months before your birthday month, your birthday month, and 3 months after your

birthday month.

Once enrolled, Social Security will mail your Medicare card and each January, your Medicare Entitlement Statement, a copy of your Medicare Entitlement Statement should be submitted to the Benefits Coordinator.

If you are 65 or older and have not enrolled in Medicare, you need to enroll as soon as possible, we can assist with avoiding late penalties.

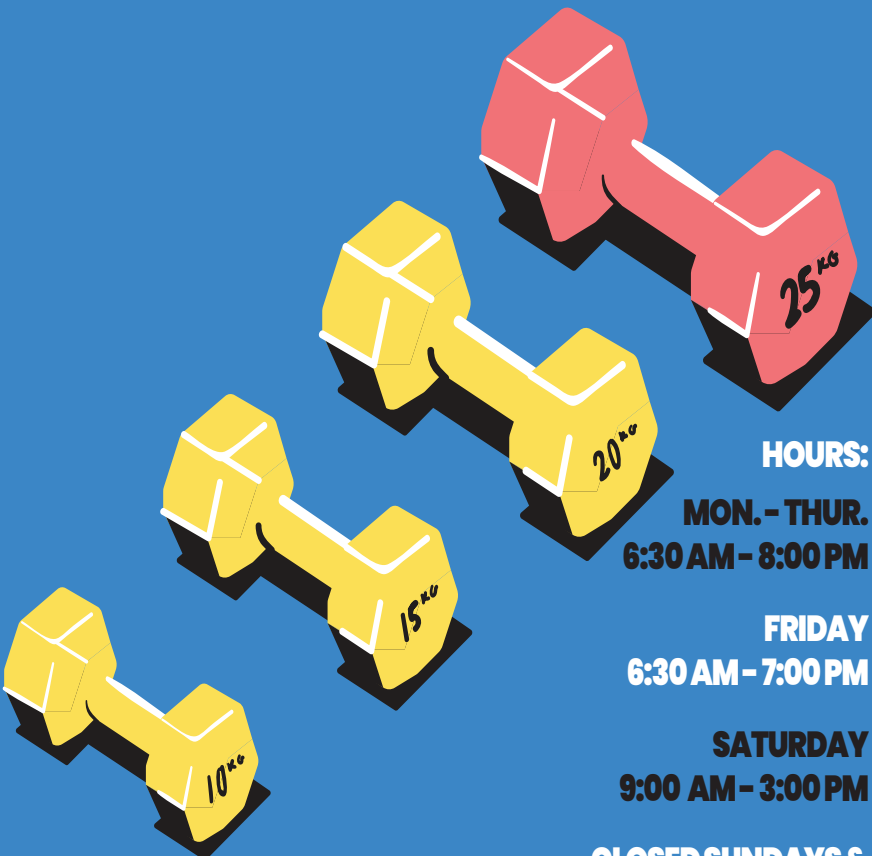

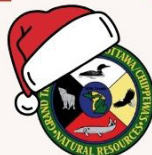
Renewal stickers are available all year, and getting yours now ensures you're prepared once the seasons shift and the woods come alive again.

AGRICULTURAL & FOOD SOVEREIGNTY

HONORING THE LAND AND BUILDING FOR THE FUTURE

As the year winds down, the GTB Agriculture & Food Sovereignty Department is proud to share the many ways we’ve been working to strengthen our community, our land, and our traditions. From expanding our farm facilities in Peshawbestown to distributing fresh, “GTB grown” items at the Membership Meeting, and from maintaining satellite gardens across the service area to preparing compost and liquid fertilizer for next year’s gardens, 2025 has been a year of growth and connection.

In this newsletter, you’ll learn about the exciting barn expansion at Peshawbestown Farm, which will help manage our fish waste and support sustainable agriculture projects. You’ll also see how our harvest made its way to the Membership Meeting tables, bringing fresh corn, squash, and handmade products to our community members and elders. We’ll provide updates on our satellite farm locations and plans for future gardens, highlight how GTB members can access compost and liquid fertilizer in 2026, and show how our fish waste compost continues to enrich our fields.



BARN ADDITION: EXPANDING OUR CAPACITY

Big things are hapening at the Peshawbestown Farm! Our farm is growing, literally. The addition of a new barn extension will increase our covered and protected storage area by nearly 25%, providing much-needed space for equipment and projects that support the health of our land and community.

This expansion is made possible thanks to “match” funding from the State of Michigan’s EGLE Organic Waste Management grant. With an additional \$205,000 in support, we’re able to continue growing the GTB Fish Waste Management Project. The new barn will house key equipment, including our recently purchased compost screener, disc tiller, and more, making it easier than ever to manage the commercial fish waste produced throughout Leelanau County. This facility is not just a structure; it’s a symbol of our commitment to sustainable practices, community health, and environmental stewardship.

SHARING THE HARVEST: GTB MEMBERSHIP MEETING DISTRIBUTION

It was a joy to share the fruits of our labor with the GTB community at this year’s Membership Meeting! Nearly 30 pounds of dried corn, along with decorative squash and pumpkins, were used for table displays and distributed to attendees.

We also prepared special gifts for our GTB Elders Department, including bottles of our pure maple syrup, maple candied pecans, and jars of delicious pickles canned right at the Strongheart Center. Every item represents the care and dedication of our Agriculture team, and as our program continues to grow, we hope to one day provide every Membership Meeting attendee with a free “GTB grown” product. Sharing our harvest is more than giving, it’s a way to connect our community to the land, to each other, and to the traditions that sustain us.

SATELLITE FARM LOCATIONS: EXPANDING OUR REACH ACROSS THE 6-COUNTY SERVICE AREA

For years, GTB Agriculture has worked to maintain satellite farm sites across the service area, including gardens at the Antrim/Kewadin GTB site, the Charlevoix Satellite Office, and a small garden at the GTB Benzie Office. These sites represent opportunities to expand our programming, connect more members with food sovereignty, and make fresh, local produce accessible throughout the region.

In 2025, we focused our efforts on the Peshawbestown Farm and the Charlevoix Satellite Office. Water and infrastructure challenges, as well as limited community involvement, led us to pause the Kewadin garden. But we are excited about the future plans are underway to establish a small garden at the Herkner property in collaboration with GTEC and GTB Housing. With GTEC’s support, we hope to see garden beds installed at Herkner in 2026, bringing new opportunities for hands-on gardening experiences to the community.

Running multiple farm sites with a two-person team comes with challenges,

but we remain committed to creating meaningful impact wherever possible. Investing in the Charlevoix Farm has been especially rewarding: we installed a shed, ran electricity to a well dormant for 15 years, and fenced two acres to make the space productive and accessible. These investments reflect our mission to make agriculture and food sovereignty programs available and sustainable for the GTB community.

LOOKING AHEAD TO 2026: COMPOST AND LIQUID FERTILIZER FOR GTB GARDENERS

Attention gardeners! In 2026, GTB members with gardens will have access to high-quality compost from the Agriculture and Food Sovereignty Department. Starting in late April or early May, we will distribute compost on a first-come, first-serve basis. Members can load trailers, truck beds, or fill buckets enough to provide up to 1 yard of compost per garden. This same compost keeps our GTB Agriculture sites thriving and was even made available for sale in 2025 at \$75 per yard.

In addition, we will continue to offer our liquid fertilizer for those looking to boost their soil health. Mark your calendars, contact us in April, and let’s grow together!

FISH WASTE COMPOST: NOURISHING THE LAND, SUPPORTING SUSTAINABILITY

Our fish waste compost program is already making a difference at Peshawbestown Farm. By turning local fish waste into nutrient-rich compost, we not only reduce environmental impact but also create a sustainable, locally produced soil amendment that strengthens our crops and supports the long-term health of our land.

The work happening at GTB Agriculture & Food Sovereignty isn’t just about farming, it’s about reconnecting with the land, honoring traditions, and creating a sustainable future for the GTB community. Whether it’s expanding our barns, sharing our harvest, or helping members grow their own gardens, every effort reflects our commitment to a thriving, food-secure community.



PUBLIC SAFETY

Winter Driving Preparedness

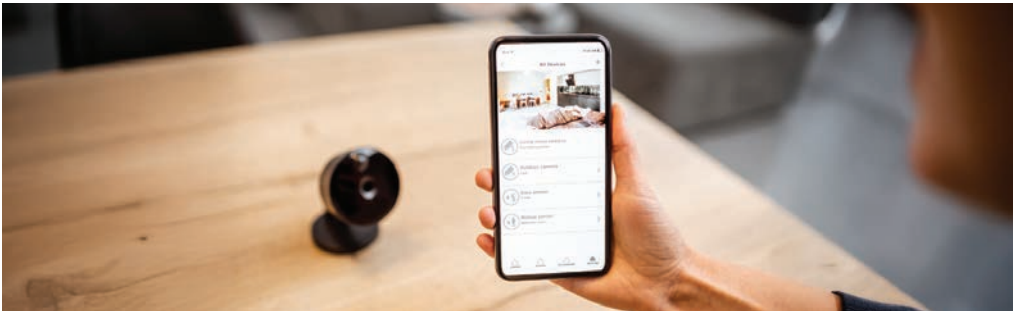


As winter settles in across Northern Michigan, the Grand Traverse Band Tribal Police and the Michigan State Police are urging community members to take time now to prepare for hazardous road conditions. Officers say that each year, the combination of early snowfall, rapidly changing temperatures, and drifting winds creates an increased risk for crashes—many of which can be prevented with proper preparation. Tribal Police emphasize the importance of equipping your vehicle before the first significant storm hits. Drivers are encouraged to check that tires have adequate tread, that vehicles are stocked with essential emergency supplies, and that wiper blades and fluid levels are prepared for freezing temperatures. Officers also remind drivers to give

themselves extra travel time, clear all snow from windows and lights before driving, and use headlights even during daylight snowstorms. In cooperation with MSP, Tribal Police note that speeding and distracted driving are leading contributors to winter crashes in rural areas. Drivers are advised to slow down on snowy or icy roads and maintain a safe distance from other vehicles, especially large trucks and snowplows. If conditions become too dangerous, law enforcement encourages motorists to delay travel when possible and report hazardous conditions. Officers say preparedness is key, the more attention we give to our vehicles and our driving habits, the safer our entire community becomes during the winter months.

Holiday Travel & Home Safety

With the holiday season approaching, the Grand Traverse Band Tribal Police and the Michigan State Police are reminding families to plan ahead for both safe travel and secure homes. Officers say this time of year typically brings an increase in road traffic, gift-related deliveries, and extended absences from homes — all factors that can contribute to preventable incidents if precautions aren’t taken. Tribal Police recommend that families preparing for holiday travel begin with a simple safety checklist: confirm route plans, ensure vehicles are winter-ready, and inform a trusted family member of travel times and destinations. During peak travel days, officers advise motorists to expect delays, reduce speed on winter roads, and remain attentive behind the wheel, especially when sharing the road with plows or emergency vehicles. For community members



Reporting Suspicious Activity

The Grand Traverse Band Tribal Police, working closely with the Michigan State Police, are reminding community members of the importance of speaking up when something doesn’t seem right. Both agencies report that timely community tips have helped prevent incidents ranging from property theft to identity fraud—issues that tend to rise during the fall and holiday seasons. Tribal Police encourage residents to trust their instincts: if a situation feels unusual or out of place, it deserves attention. Suspicious activity may include unfamiliar vehicles lingering in neighborhoods, individuals attempting to access secured buildings, packages being removed from porches, or unexpected requests for personal information. Officers note that reporting concerns promptly gives law enforcement a better chance of identifying potential threats before they escalate. The cooperative effort between Tribal Police and MSP ensures that tips are evaluated quickly and resources are directed where they’re most needed. Community members are encouraged to call the GTB Tribal Police Department for local concerns or 911 in emergencies. Anonymous tips are also accepted. Tribal Police leadership has noted our community is strongest when we look out for one another even a small piece of information can make a big difference.



Be Prepared for Winter Emergencies

As we welcome the winter weather, the Grand Traverse Band Tribal Police and GTB Emergency Management are encouraging households to take a few simple steps to stay prepared for unexpected emergencies. Power outages, heavy snowfall, and hazardous travel can happen with little warning, but officers say early preparation can make all the difference. Emergency officials recommend keeping a small home kit with water, nonperishable food, flashlights, batteries, blankets, and a phone charger. Families who rely on medications or medical equipment should include an extra supply and copies of important prescriptions. Having two to three days of essentials is ideal during winter storm season. Tribal Police also urge families to establish a basic communication plan so everyone knows who to contact if phone lines are disrupted. Households with elders or young children may benefit from posting important medical information in an easy-to-find location. GTB Public Safety continues to coordinate closely with MSP and regional emergency partners to ensure fast responses during severe weather. Community members are encouraged to sign up for GTB emergency alerts and stay informed through Tribal Police updates. Preparedness doesn’t need to be complicated, a few simple steps can help keep our families and community safe.



FIRE & RESCUE



Cultural & Ceremonial Fire Safety in Winter

For many tribal communities, fire plays a vital role in cultural and ceremonial practices. During the winter months, when gatherings often take place indoors or around contained outdoor fires, it is essential to prioritize fire safety to protect both participants and sacred traditions.

SAFE PRACTICES FOR CEREMONIAL FIRES

- 1. Designated Fire Keeper:** Assign a responsible individual as the fire keeper, ensuring that someone is always monitoring the fire to maintain control and safety.
- 2. Proper Location:** Ensure ceremonial fires are held in open, well-ventilated spaces. If indoors, confirm that the venue allows for open flames and has proper fire safety measures in place.
- 3. Weather Precautions:** For outdoor fires, choose a location protected from strong winds. Have water, sand, or fire extinguishers on hand to quickly manage unexpected flare-ups.
- 4. Fire Pit Maintenance:** Use fireproof materials to build the fire pit. If it's a permanent site, check for cracks or wear in the structure to prevent embers from escaping.
- 5. Clothing Awareness:** Encourage participants to wear non-flammable, fitted clothing to reduce the risk of accidental ignition near the fire.
- 6. Material Selection:** Burn only natural materials, such as untreated wood, to avoid toxic fumes. Avoid accelerants,

as they can cause uncontrollable flames.

- 7. Clear Boundaries:** Set up a clear perimeter around the fire to prevent individuals, especially children, from getting too close.
- 8. Ventilation for Indoor Fires:** If the ceremonial fire is held indoors, use proper ventilation to reduce smoke buildup and the risk of carbon monoxide poisoning. Carbon monoxide detectors should be in place and tested before the ceremony.

EDUCATING THE COMMUNITY

The Grand Traverse Band Fire Department encourages tribal members to balance cultural practices with modern safety precautions. Hosting community workshops or distributing educational materials on ceremonial fire safety can help spread awareness and ensure safe practices are followed.

RESPECTING TRADITIONS WHILE ENSURING SAFETY

Fire ceremonies carry deep spiritual significance, and safety measures should enhance, not hinder, these practices. By incorporating fire safety into cultural traditions, tribal communities can honor their heritage while safeguarding lives and property.

Holiday Cooking Lead Cause of December House Fires

With many families preparing for holiday gatherings, December tends to be one of the busiest months for cooking-related incidents. The GTB Fire Department often responds to kitchen emergencies around this time, many of which begin with unattended food or grease overheating on the stove.

This seasonal pattern is common across the region and remains a concern in tribal households as kitchens become the center of celebrations. The combination of crowded homes, multiple dishes cooking at once, and frequent distractions increases the potential for small flare-ups to escalate.

The department is encouraging community members to stay mindful during holiday meal preparations, particularly in multi-generational homes where activity can be higher. Keeping stove areas clear, staying within sight of cooking food, and having a plan for safely handling grease can help ensure celebrations stay safe throughout the month.

GTB Fire Dept. Celebrates EMT Achievements & Regional Training Milestones

The Grand Traverse Band Fire Department is celebrating an important milestone this month as Firefighter/EMT Carolyn Fairchild successfully completed her Emergency Medical Technician Basic program and passed the National Registry EMT examination. Her certification marks a significant step in her continued service to the Grand Traverse Band community and the department.

Fairchild's accomplishment follows months of rigorous training that included more than two hundred hours of classroom instruction, hands-on clinical experience, and extensive independent study. She was one of thirteen individuals who completed the region's most recent EMT training cohort—an effort supported by multiple northern Michigan fire and emergency services agencies.

The program was coordinated through Green Lake Township Emergency Services and included instructors and leadership from several departments. Training partners involved in this cohort included representatives from Traverse City Fire, Leland Township Fire & Rescue, and the Northwest Regional Training Center, along with participation from GTB Fire Rescue personnel. Firefighters from across the region, including Fairchild, engaged in a collaborative learning environment that emphasized foundational medical skills, emergency response, and community-based care.

The Grand Traverse Band Fire Department expressed pride in Fairchild's progress throughout the program, from her successful completion of the coursework earlier this year to the achievement of earning her National EMS Certification. Her dedication reflects the department's continued commitment to building strong, skilled response teams for the tribal community.

As new EMTs prepare to enter the field across the region, the department recognizes the hard work and determination that brought this group through months of demanding training. Fairchild's achievement stands as a highlight for the GTB Fire Department, representing ongoing investment in both professional development and high-quality emergency care for tribal members.

Born in 1949 to David and Alice Spinniken, he married his beloved, Barb MacLaurin, on September 8, 1973. Raised on a cherry farm in Leelanau County, he took pride in hard work and even after retirement he was tireless in his passion to serve. His favorite pastimes were getting involved in new construction projects, spending time with his family, and boating. Dave was also a gardener whose worm farm contributed to a bounty every year. He had several crow friends, and was at heart, a child of the woods who loved a good hike. Dave and his wife, Barb, shared many interests, and on their hikes, they could identify species of all sorts of plants, trees and mushrooms. They were devoted to the fine arts community in Northern Michigan, and it is this generation of the 1960's-70's artists who shaped the vibrant Arts community we see in Northern Michigan today. He loved to dance, especially to local folk bands. Dave and Barb enjoyed many festivals around Michigan and loved to camp. He never forgot his roots and always considered himself a Leland boy. In 1980, Dave graduated Cum Laude from Northern Michigan University with a Bachelor of Science. He had a major in industrial education and a minor in psychology. A dedicated professional, he started his career teaching workshop skills to challenged adults. In 2016, he celebrated retirement from his twenty-year passion – as editor “Scoop” of the Grand Traverse Band News. Under his leadership, he created a dynamic department with an essential role in the band's community. His compassionate nature is most evident throughout his life, and his brilliance will be missed. He is remembered by many as a mentor whose good nature brought an element of fun to many tasks. Dave was preceded in death by his parents. He is survived by his three children, Faye, Arian, and Adam; his sisters, Bev and Jen; his brother, Jim; as well as several nieces, nephews, and his seven adored grandchildren. His absence will be felt most strongly by his family, for he was an invested caregiver whose wisdom was always available to anyone he encountered. Interment of ashes will take place in the family plot at Leland Cemetery in April of 2026, followed by a close family gathering. At his request, there will be a friends and family celebration of life in September of 2026.
