Dear Tribal Members,

I write to explain the governmental process the Grand Traverse Band of Ottawa and Chippewa Indians ("OTB" or "Tribe") has undertaken regarding the proposed acquisition of the NMC Boardman Lake Campus.

Boardman Lake Campus consists of approximately 28 acres and includes a 74,500 ft.2 three-story building originally constructed in 1986, with approximately 3,000 linear feet of frontage along Boardman Lake. The proposed purchase price is \$27 million.

The Tribal Council has received both formal and informal questions from tribal citizens regarding this proposed acquisition. For several years, the Council - along with prior Councils - has evaluated options for additional or replacement governmental office space in the Traverse City service area. Because our current government buildings are fully depreciated under our primary federal agency contracts, their accounting-defined useful life has ended. Consequently, this Council and past Councils were always faced with the issue of whether to rehabilitate or replace the buildings. These replacement reviews and actions included, among others, the former Bertha Voss School Building in 2018-2019, commercial development across from GTRS LLC in 2019-2021, and several other locations. This Council and past Councils have done rehabilitation of existing governmental buildings but the costs of rehabilitation of aging buildings are increasing with limited extensions of the useful life of the building.

Thus, between 2018 and 2025, the Council adopted multiple motions authorizing the review of properties for the development of governmental offices and service centers in both Peshawbestown and Traverse City areas. All Council actions were taken

in accordance with the Council's Land Acquisition Protocol, which was adopted by motion in February 2012.

As part of the long-term planning efforts, the Council authorized preliminary architectural and space planning studies to assess the Tribe's current and future governmental facility needs. These studies evaluated existing governmental uses and included proposals for a new governmental complex in Peshawbestown to replace the Tribe's aging infrastructure. (The Peshawbestown Governmental Center was originally built in 1980, with expansions, and currently accounts for approximately 6,000 sq. feet). Architecturally developed construction costs estimate for the new Peshawbestown governmental service center exceeded \$45 million. In response, the Council explored alternatives that could reduce overall costs, including the acquisition of existing facilities in Traverse City that could serve tribal governmental functions. The decision to pursue the Boardman Lake Campus arose from the planning process and reflects continuity in the Tribe's long term governmental infrastructure strategy to provide centrally located services for Tribal citizens.

The GTB Land Acquisition Protocol establishes detailed procedural and substantive requirements for acquiring property for a tribal governmental purpose. These included an initial feasibility review addressing the property's location, acreage, current uses, asking price, tax maps, surveys, and zoning classifications. The property is then evaluated against specific criteria, including whether it is located within the Tribe's 6 county service area; whether it is contiguous to existing tribal property; whether it has historical ties to the Tribe; whether it fulfills identified governmental needs; whether the asking price is justified in relation to intended use; and whether it aligns with the Tribe's development plans.

If these criteria are met the acquisition process proceeds. The Council directs an independent appraisal, a comprehensive building inspection, site visits by tribal representatives or council members, environmental reviews, and a legal review by tribal legal counsel to identify any issues that complete or impede acquisition.

Once the appraisal is completed, it is presented to the Council for consideration. The Council then determines, by motion, whether to authorize an offer to purchase and approve a preliminary corresponding financing budget. Upon authorization, the Land Acquisition Officer negotiates with the seller's representative. If negotiations exceed the approved budget, the matter is returned to the Council for further direction. If an agreement is reached, the Tribe's attorney prepares the necessary

deeds, title documents and escrow conditions, and the GTB Governmental Chief Financial Officer further evaluates financing options for the acquisition and adoption by the Council.

The Council has followed this established process with respect to the Boardman Lake Campus property.

In summary, the Boardman Lake Campus represents a financially viable alternative to previously reviewed options for replacing or supplementing governmental offices and service centers in both Peshawbestown and Traverse City. The anticipated financing structure is a collaborative debt facility with a commercial lender and a loan guaranty from a federal agency (Department of Agriculture, Department of the Interior or other federal agency) resulting in favorable terms with interest rates.

The Tribe anticipates subdividing the property by conveying most of the acreage to the GTB Land Trust, while retaining the existing 74,500 ft.2 building on its approximately 2-acre stand-alone parcel. Following the subdivision, the Council intends to submit a fee-to-trust application for the building parcel to the Secretary of the Interior seeking reservation status (Reservation Declaration under federal law) for purposes that include convening Tribal Council Governmental meetings at the site. Until Reservation Declaration is obtained for the new site, governmental meetings will continue in Peshawbestown.

The property is located within the Tribe's existing tax agreement area with the State of Michigan and thus applicable income tax exemption for tribal members would apply to activities at the site.

Finally, the Council emphasizes that this proposed acquisition remains in progress and has not yet been completed. The Tribe submitted a letter of intent on December 30, 2025, which the NMC President accepted. That acceptance is contingent upon execution of a formal purchase agreement which is anticipated on January 26, 2026, and the subsequent completion of a 30- -day due diligence. The Tribe anticipates closing to be in March or April 2026.

The Council will continue to keep tribal members informed as this process moves forward. Thank you for your interest and questions in this important opportunity for the Tribe.

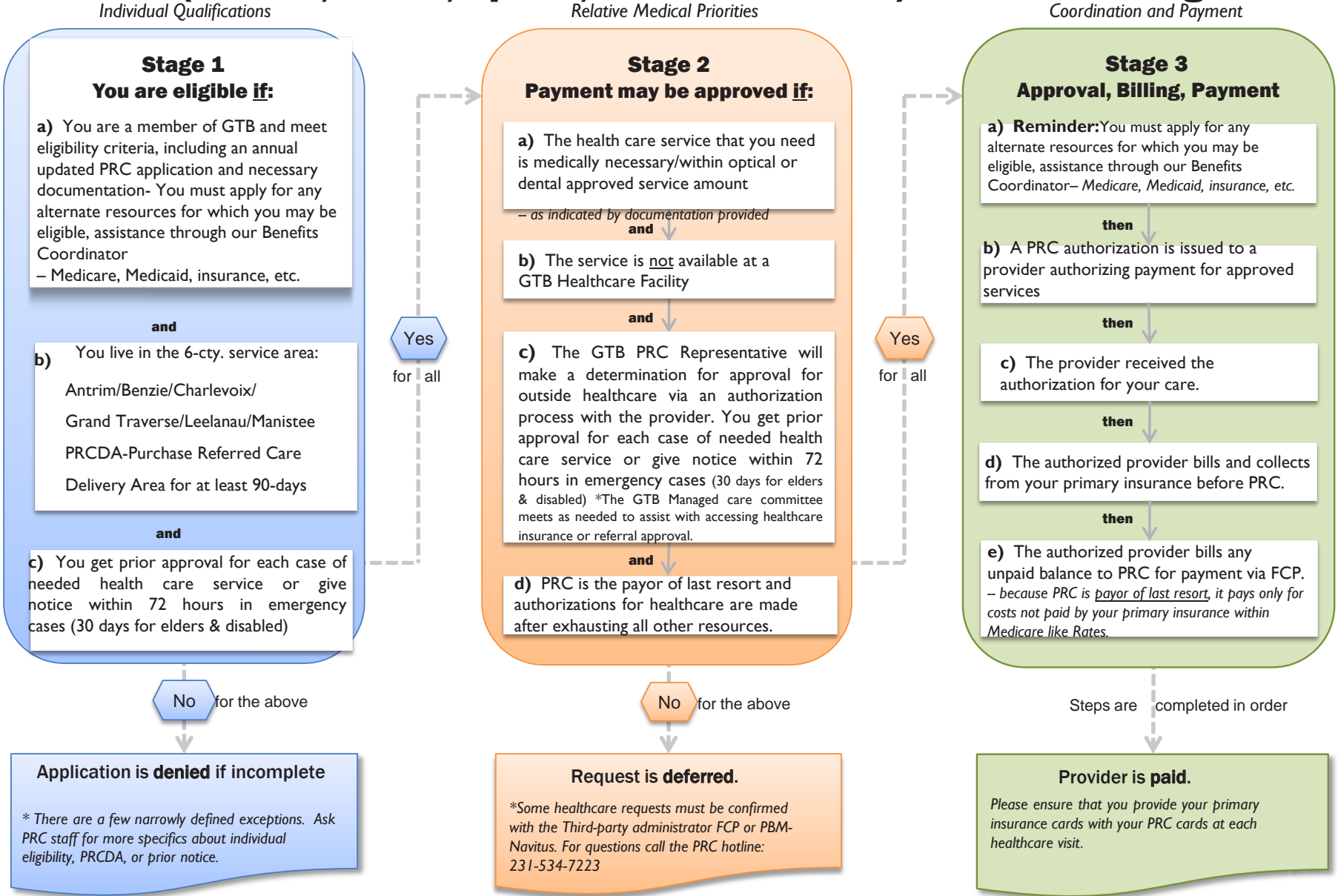

## SAFE MEDICATION DISPOSAL

As we start the new year, now is a great time to go through medicine cabinets/drawers and dispose of old medication. There are many ways to get rid of medication, so before you throw yours in the trash make sure there isn't a safer option. It's always best to dispose of medications that you are no longer actively taking and not keep them for "just in case." Many accidental poisonings at home occur from leftover medications. One of the best ways to dispose of unwanted medications is through a take-back program. These programs can use a mail back system or have a receptacle located at a pharmacy or clinic. In our area we have year-round receptacles located at CVS- 626 W Front St, Meijer Traverse City and Meijer Acme. We also have a medication receptacle located in the GTB Clinic. If access to

a drug receptacle is not an option the GTB Pharmacy can offer you a kit to dispose of your medications safely at home. We have a free system we can hand out to you call RXDestroyer. Rx Destroyer is a brand of pharmaceutical disposal system designed to safely and irreversibly neutralize unwanted or expired medications (including controlled substances) using a patented formula with activated carbon, preventing drug diversion, abuse, and environmental contamination, making it compliant with DEA, EPA and FDA guidelines for at-home use. Users simply add pills to the container, shake to mix the solution, and then discard the sealed bottle into the regular trash. If you have more questions please call GTB Pharmacy at 231-534-7350

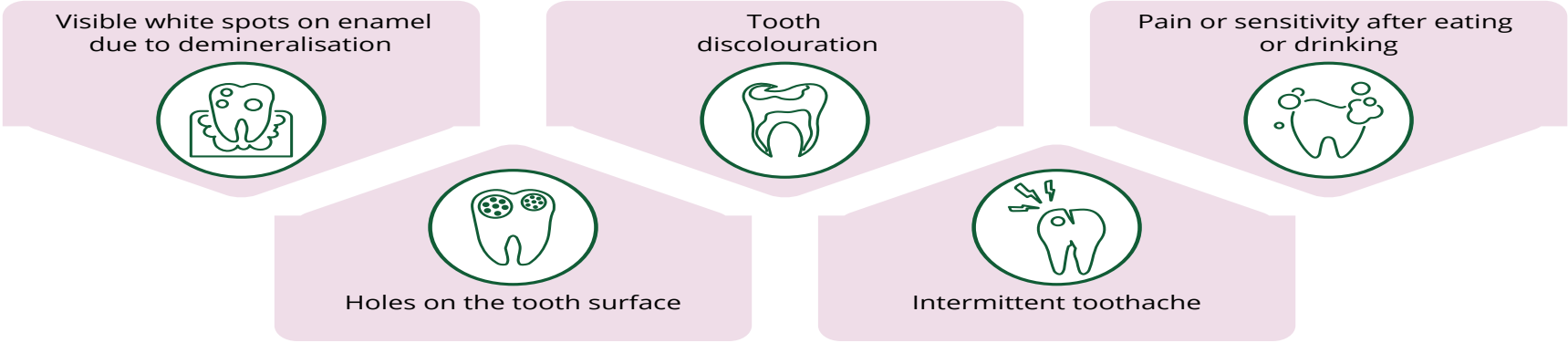

## FEBRUARY IS CHILDREN’S DENTAL AWARENESS MONTH A FOCUS ON ORAL HEALTH FOR ANISHINAABE FAMILIES

Each February, communities across the United States recognize National Children’s Dental Health Month (NCDHM) to raise awareness about the importance of children’s oral health. This national observance offers an opportunity for families, educators, caregivers, and health professionals to promote practices that protect young smiles and support overall health throughout childhood and into adulthood.

### Look out for the signs and symptoms of dental cavities



### THE SCOPE OF THE PROBLEM: TOOTH DECAY IN CHILDREN

Tooth decay, also referred to as dental caries, continues to be the most common chronic disease among children in the United States, affecting a significant percentage of youth before adulthood. Decay not only causes pain and infection, but it can interfere with eating, speaking, learning, and school attendance.

Each year, dental disease contributes to millions of hours of missed school and work, highlighting the broader impact beyond oral pain.

### WHAT CAUSES TOOTH DECAY?

Tooth decay develops when bacteria in the mouth feed on sugars and carbohydrates from the foods and beverages children consume. These bacteria produce acids that weaken the enamel, the protective outer layer of the tooth. If this process continues over time without interruption through daily oral hygiene and healthy eating, cavities can form.

Many everyday foods and drinks contain added sugars, including high fructose corn syrup, even when they are not obviously sweet. These added sugars play a significant role in promoting cavities.

### FOODS THAT SUPPORT HEALTHY TEETH

- Anticariogenic Foods** - Certain foods help protect teeth by supplying beneficial nutrients, stimulating saliva flow, and minimizing acid production:
- ◆ Dairy products (milk, cheese, yogurt) provide calcium and phosphorus, key minerals for enamel strength.
  - ◆ Fiber-rich fruits and vegetables (apples, carrots, celery) help clean teeth and stimulate saliva, which neutralizes acids.
  - ◆ Nuts and seeds offer minerals

- that support healthy teeth and encourage chewing.
- ◆ Tea (green, black) contains compounds that may help suppress harmful bacteria.
  - ◆ Sugar-free gum stimulates saliva flow and assists in cleansing the mouth after meals.

Including these foods in balanced meals and snacks can help lower the risk of developing cavities.

### FOODS THAT INCREASE CAVITY RISK

- Cariogenic Foods** - Foods and drinks high in sugars and refined carbohydrates can feed decay-causing bacteria. These include:
- ◆ Fruit juices and sweetened beverages
  - ◆ Soda and flavored drinks.
  - ◆ Candies and sweets.
  - ◆ Processed snacks and baked goods with added sugars.
  - ◆ White bread and refined grain products.

Limiting the frequency and portion size of these items especially between meals,

reduces continuous sugar exposure for teeth.

### DAILY ORAL HEALTH HABITS

- Preventing tooth decay involves more than diet. Establishing consistent oral hygiene habits supports long-term dental health:
- ◆ Brush twice daily with a fluoride toothpaste.
  - ◆ Floss daily to remove plaque between teeth.
  - ◆ Regular dental check-ups allow early detection and prevention of cavities.
  - ◆ Drink fluoridated water to help strengthen enamel.

Routine care not only prevents disease but also builds confidence and comfort for children at the dentist.

### NATIONAL RESOURCES AND MATERIALS

- The American Dental Association (ADA) offers tools and materials you can download and share with families and schools during Dental Health Month and throughout the year. These include posters, flyers, coloring sheets, brushing calendars, and planning guides to encourage habits that prevent tooth decay. Available resources include:
- ◆ Printable posters in multiple sizes.
  - ◆ Coloring sheets for children.
  - ◆ A 12-month brushing calendar.
  - ◆ Program planning guide and activity ideas.

### INVESTING IN HEALTHY SMILES

Oral health is an integral part of overall health. By promoting balanced diets, consistent hygiene habits, and regular dental visits, Anishinaabe families and communities can help children develop strong, healthy teeth that support their growth, learning, and quality of life.

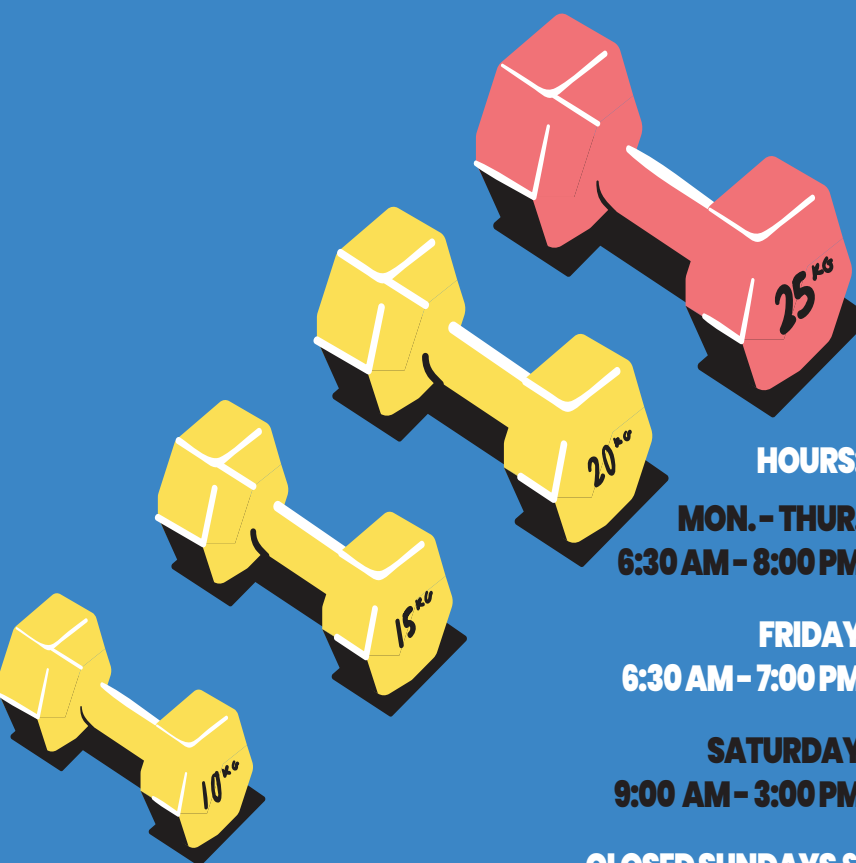

## BRIDGING THE CRYSTAL RIVER:

The Crystal River is one of northern Michigan's most treasured waterways, flowing through the heart of Sleeping Bear Dunes National Lakeshore—an area often described as one of America's most beautiful places. Yet beneath this scenic reputation lies a challenge shared by watersheds across the Great Lakes region: undersized and improperly aligned road-stream crossings that disrupt natural river processes, block fish passage, and degrade habitat.

Across the landscape, these problematic crossings are nearly ubiquitous. When addressed individually, their replacement can yield localized ecological benefits. When addressed at a watershed or multi-watershed scale, however, the results are systemic—restoring natural river function for generations to come. This is the vision behind the Crystal River road-stream crossing project.

Led by the Grand Traverse Band of Ottawa and Chippewa Indians and Conservation Resource Alliance, in partnership with the Leelanau County Road Commission and Sleeping Bear Dunes National Lakeshore, the project is made possible through coordinated funding from the Bureau of Indian Affairs, the Natural Resources Conservation Service, and—critically—the Great Lakes Restoration Initiative (GLRI). GLRI funding has played a central role in turning long-standing restoration priorities into on-the-ground action.

The Crystal River experiences intense recreational pressure, with tens of thousands of paddlers visiting each year. Combined with an aging road network that bisects the river, this use places additional strain on aquatic habitat and stream stability. By replacing undersized culverts with properly designed bridges, the project reconnects hydrologic pathways for fish and wildlife while also reducing erosion, sedimentation, and the concentrated foot traffic caused by poorly functioning crossings.



Construction began with the replacement of the Tucker Lake Outlet crossing in 2023, followed by the completion of Bridge #3 in 2024 at County Road 675—locally known as “shoot the tubes.” This site was transformed from a set of undersized triple culverts into a free-span timber bridge, restoring natural flow and eliminating a major barrier to aquatic organism passage. In 2025, work began on Crossings #1 and #2, with full project completion expected in the spring 2026.

These final crossings will be replaced with a combination of timber and steel beam bridges, all designed to span the bankfull width of the river.

Once complete, the project will reconnect approximately 4.8 miles of fluvial habitat, restoring access for native Great Lakes fish species historically unable to navigate the elevated water velocities created by culverts. The restored crossings will also allow sediment and large wood to move naturally through the system, uncovering



buried habitat and improving river function across multiple reaches. At the Tucker Lake Outlet, a frequently plugged culvert is being replaced with a larger aluminum box culvert, reducing flood risk to the roadway while restoring aquatic connectivity.

This project demonstrates the lasting value of GLRI funding. By supporting tribal-led, science-based infrastructure improvements, GLRI helps restore ecological connectivity, protect public investments in roads, enhance recreational opportunities, and safeguard the long-term health of Great Lakes tributaries. The Crystal River project is a clear example of how strategic federal funding delivers measurable, multigenerational benefits—for fish, for people, and for a free-flowing river.

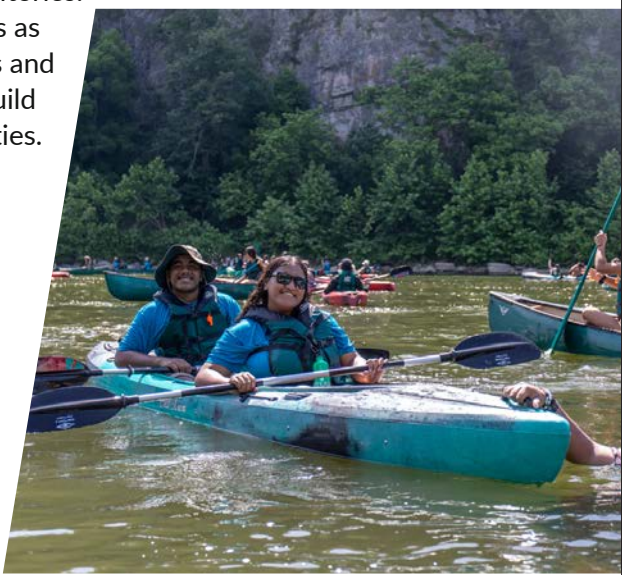

GROWING FROM THE LAND: STRENGTHENING ANISHINAABE FOODWAYS, CULTURE, AND COMMUNITY

The Agriculture & Food Sovereignty Department continues to grow programs that reflect Anishinaabe values of respect for the land, seasonal living, and collective care. As we begin 2026, these efforts highlight how traditional knowledge and modern infrastructure can work together to strengthen food systems, support community wellness, and ensure that cultural teachings remain alive and accessible. From the first sap runs of spring to the sharing of community-grown foods, these initiatives represent more than programs, they are living traditions.

2026 GTB SUGAR BUSH CAMP:  
WELCOMING THE MAPLE  
SEASON TOGETHER

The annual GTB Sugar Bush Camp marks an important seasonal transition—when winter begins to loosen its grip and the maple trees awaken. Held over four days in March, the 2026 camp invites community members of all ages to take part in the tapping of maple trees and the cultural practices that surround this time of year.

The Sugar Bush has long been a place of work, teaching, and community gathering for Anishinaabe people. Camp participants will have the opportunity to learn how maple trees are tapped, why sap flows during this season, and how maple sugar has historically provided nourishment after long winters.

Light food and refreshments will be prepared each day, featuring maple products that celebrate the harvest and connect participants directly to the purpose of the gathering. Time spent around the fire will offer warmth, conversation, and opportunities for learning across generations.

HANDS-ON TEACHINGS  
ROOTED IN ANISHINAABE  
KNOWLEDGE

Throughout the four days of camp, a variety of cultural and practical activities will be offered. These include storytelling, birch bark crafting, woodworking, and sewing winter gear—skills that were essential to survival and remain deeply connected to Anishinaabe identity.

Storytelling sessions will share teachings tied to the land and the Sugar Bush, helping participants understand not only how things are done, but why they matter. Crafting and hands-on workshops will allow participants to work with natural materials, learn traditional techniques, and leave with a deeper appreciation for the knowledge passed down through generations.

These activities create space for learning by doing, strengthening cultural pride while encouraging curiosity and connection among youth, families, and Elders.



A NEW LODGE FOR  
GATHERING AND  
COMMUNITY CONNECTION

A The Sugar Bush continues to evolve as a welcoming space for community use. At the end of 2025, the Raphael Family generously supported the installation of a new lodge that will be used during the 2026 Sugar Bush Camp and for future gatherings.

The lodge is designed with a large central fire and seating along the sides, creating an environment well-suited for teaching, storytelling, meals, and reflection. This addition enhances the Sugar Bush as a place where cultural knowledge can be shared in comfort, regardless of weather, and where community members can come together in a meaningful way. The lodge represents a shared investment in the future of Anishinaabe traditions and ensures the Sugar Bush remains a vibrant, accessible space for learning and celebration.

FISH WASTE COMPOST  
PROJECT: BUILDING  
SUSTAINABLE SYSTEMS  
FROM THE GROUND UP

The GTB Fish Waste Compost Project continues to gain momentum as both an environmental and agricultural success. In 2026, the program will enter its first full operational season using new equipment received through grant funding in 2025.

This equipment including a compost screener, compost spreader, larger tractor, and disc cultivator allows staff to process organic material more efficiently and incorporate finished compost into farm fields with greater ease. These improvements reduce labor, increase production capacity, and help return valuable nutrients back to the soil.

By transforming fish waste into a usable soil amendment, the project supports sustainable farming practices while reducing waste and honoring the principle of using all that the land and water provide.

EXPANDING  
INFRASTRUCTURE TO  
SUPPORT LONG-TERM  
PROGRAM SUSTAINABILITY

Grant funding will also support the construction of a covered compost storage

bay in 2026. This new structure will allow finished compost to be stored in a protected environment, improving consistency and quality while making the product more readily available for sale.

The storage bay will be located near the fish waste processing barn and modeled after the structure shown in the accompanying image. Once completed, the expanded infrastructure will position the program to offer compost for sale and delivery to local growers.

Revenue generated through compost sales will help sustain the Fish Waste Compost Project long term, supporting continued operations while strengthening regional food production and soil health.



COMMUNITY GROWN &  
ASHED CORN: HONORING  
TRADITION THROUGH FOOD  
SHARING



Beginning in February, dried ashed corn grown and prepared by the GTB community will be available through GTB Anishinaabe Family Services as part of funerary offerings. Ashed corn holds deep cultural significance and plays an important role in honoring loved ones during times of loss.

In addition to funerary use, ashed corn will be distributed through GTB Food Pantry sites to ensure community access to this traditional food. Initial distribution locations include the 3 Mile Office Pantry and the Medicine Lodge pantry, with availability at the Charlevoix and Benzie pantries to follow shortly after.

This initiative reflects the department’s commitment to food sovereignty—ensuring that culturally important foods are grown, prepared, and shared within the community, by the community. It also serves as a reminder that food is not only nourishment, but a way of caring for one another and honoring Anishinaabe traditions.



# PUBLIC SAFETY

## Winter Safety: Preventing Cold-Weather Injuries and Emergencies

Michigan winters bring beauty—but also serious risks. Each year, cold temperatures, snow, and ice lead to preventable injuries and health emergencies. Taking simple precautions can protect you and your loved ones throughout the winter season.

### Avoid Ice and Falls

Walking on ice is extremely dangerous. Many winter injuries result from slips and falls on icy sidewalks, steps, driveways, and porches. Keep walking surfaces clear by using rock salt or other de-icing compounds, and use sand for added traction. Wear slip-resistant footwear and walk slowly with short steps—sometimes called “walking like a penguin.”

### Travel with Caution

Before traveling, listen for winter weather advisories from the National Weather Service. Avoid travel during low visibility or on ice-covered roads, bridges,

and overpasses whenever possible. If travel is necessary, inform someone of your destination and expected arrival time, carry a fully charged cell phone, and ensure your vehicle is stocked with winter emergency supplies and warm clothing. Never rely on a vehicle alone for heat, and never pour hot water on a frozen windshield—it may shatter.

### Recreate Safely Outdoors

If hiking, camping, or skiing, let someone know where you are going and when you plan to return. Dress in layers, avoid sweating, and keep exposed skin covered. Pack emergency supplies such as dry clothing, waterproof matches, a two-way radio, and fire starters. Avoid alcohol, drugs, and excessive caffeine, and stay alert for signs of cold-related illness.

Preparedness and awareness save lives. Stay informed, slow down, and take winter conditions seriously.



## Cold-Weather Health Emergencies: Know the Signs of Hypothermia and Frostbite

Prolonged exposure to cold temperatures can lead to serious health emergencies, even when temperatures are above freezing. The most common cold-related conditions are hypothermia and frostbite, both of which require immediate attention.

Hypothermia occurs when the body loses heat faster than it can produce it, causing body temperature to drop below normal. Low body temperature affects the brain, making it difficult for a person to think clearly or move normally—often without realizing something is wrong.

Those most at risk include older adults, infants, people without adequate heating or clothing, individuals who remain outdoors for long periods, and those who use alcohol or drugs.

Adults may experience confusion, slurred speech, shivering, exhaustion, fumbling hands, and drowsiness. Infants may have bright red, cold skin and very low energy.

If a person’s body temperature falls below 95°F, it is a medical emergency. Seek medical attention immediately. If help is delayed, move the person to a warm shelter, remove wet clothing, and warm the core of the body first using blankets or skin-to-skin contact. Provide warm (non-alcoholic) beverages only if the person is conscious.

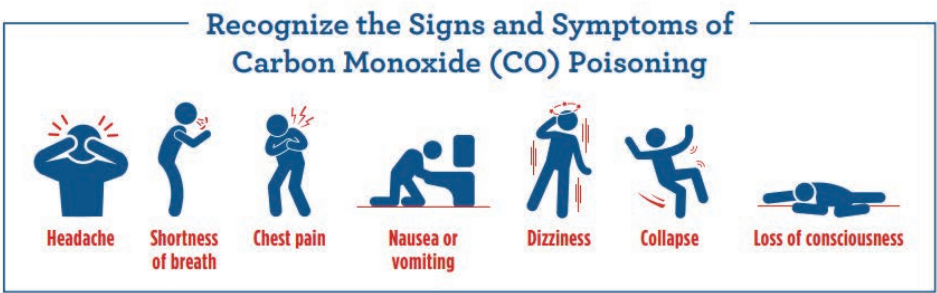
Frostbite happens when skin freezes due to extreme cold exposure and can cause permanent damage. Early signs include numbness and red or pale skin. Severe cases may involve white or bluish-gray skin and loss of sensation or movement.

### Prevention Tips

- Dress in loose, layered clothing
- Wear hats, mittens, and insulated socks
- Limit time outdoors
- Avoid alcohol and drugs
- Stay dry

Recognizing symptoms early and acting quickly can prevent serious injury or death.

## DANGER! Protect Yourself & Your Family from Carbon Monoxide Poisoning



## Carbon Monoxide Safety: Protecting Your Home and Family This Winter

Carbon monoxide (CO) is an invisible, odorless gas often called the “silent killer.” It is produced whenever fuel is burned and can build up quickly in enclosed or partially enclosed spaces. Each year, carbon monoxide poisoning claims lives and sends thousands to emergency rooms—most often during the winter months.

### Common Sources of CO

- Gas or oil furnaces and water heaters
- Portable generators
- Fireplaces and wood stoves
- Charcoal grills and camp stoves
- Vehicles running in garages

Portable generators, in particular, produce hundreds of times more carbon monoxide than a car and should never be used indoors or near windows, doors, or vents.

### Use Generators Safely

- Operate generators outdoors only
- Keep them at least 20 feet away from buildings
- Never use generators in homes, garages, basements, campers, or sheds

- Remember that CO can linger even after the generator is turned off

### Install and Maintain CO Detectors

- Install carbon monoxide detectors on every level of your home and near sleeping areas
- Test detectors monthly
- Replace batteries regularly or use 10-year lithium battery models

### Know the Symptoms

Carbon monoxide poisoning symptoms resemble the flu and may include headache, dizziness, nausea, fatigue, chest tightness, confusion, or unconsciousness. People who are sleeping or intoxicated may not recognize symptoms before it’s too late.

### If You Suspect CO Poisoning

- Get outside to fresh air immediately
- Call 911
- Do not re-enter the building until emergency personnel say it is safe

Carbon monoxide poisoning is preventable. Stay aware, maintain heating equipment, and always prioritize fresh air and proper ventilation this winter.

Through training, preparedness, and teamwork, the Fire Department remains committed to providing reliable emergency services throughout the winter season while prioritizing the safety of the Peshawbestown community.

### FROSTBITE

A victim is often unaware of frostbite because frozen tissue is numb.



**Signs & Symptoms**


- Redness or pain in any skin area may be the first sign of frostbite.

**Other signs include:**

- a white or grayish-yellow skin area
- skin that feels unusually firm or waxy
- numbness

### HYPOTHERMIA

Hypothermia often occurs at very cold temperatures, but can occur at cool temperatures (above 40°F), if a person is wet (from rain, sweat or cold water) and becomes chilled.



**Signs & Symptoms**

**Adults:**

- shivering
- exhaustion
- confusion
- fumbling hands
- memory loss
- slurred speech
- drowsiness

**Infants:**

- bright red, cold skin
- very low energy

## Extreme Cold Brings Increased Risk of Hypothermia and Frostbite

With recent wind chills reaching –10 degrees and some areas experiencing temperatures as low as –25 degrees, the Grand Traverse Band Fire Department reminds community members to remain vigilant during extreme cold weather conditions.

Prolonged exposure to cold temperatures can quickly lead to hypothermia and frostbite, both of which are serious medical emergencies. Hypothermia occurs when the body loses heat faster than it can produce it, causing a dangerously low body temperature. Frostbite affects exposed skin, particularly fingers, toes, ears, and noses, and can result in permanent tissue damage if not treated promptly.

### Community members are encouraged to:

- Dress in layers and cover exposed skin
- Limit time outdoors during extreme cold
- Check on elders, children, and vulnerable individuals
- Ensure pets are brought indoors
- Seek immediate medical attention if symptoms of hypothermia or frostbite are suspected

The Fire Department also reminds residents to use extra caution when traveling during severe cold, as vehicle breakdowns can quickly become dangerous in low temperatures. Keeping an emergency winter kit in your vehicle can help reduce risk while waiting for assistance.

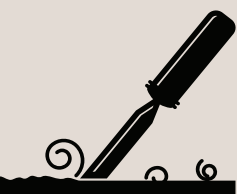

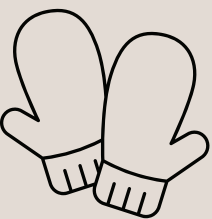

## HOW DOES IT WORK

Different maple products are made by heating maple syrup to a higher boiling temperature. Crystallization of the sugars in maple syrup will begin when enough water is removed from the syrup, so the larger sucrose molecules can begin to bond together. The more water removed, the tighter the crystallization bonding.

## ABOUT ISHIGAMIZIGAN

The ancestors of Grand Traverse Band citizens processed maple sugar using traditional techniques. This included use of birch bark baskets to collect the sap, sumac stems to use as “taps” or spiles. Sugar was derived by removing ice from the baskets, and boiling sap in animal skin containers using heated rocks.

Maple sugar is easier to transport, and more shelf stable than maple syrup. Sugar was used as a sweetener, and also to preserve meats. Maple sugar, in moderation, has medicinal uses as well. It is a miraculous natural product that makes evident the sophisticated and productive life ways that sustained this community.
