

Provides direct victim assistance services to Native American victims of crime in the six-county service area. This program ensures that health and safety needs of the victims are met, responds to victim needs throughout the prosecution phase of crime, and provides support and assistance to victims of all types of crime.

Types of services provided by the GTB Tribal Victim Assistance Program include: informing victims of their rights, transportation assistance to court, emotional support, referrals for counseling or other assistance, victim notification, advocacy and support in Tribal/State/Federal Courts, assistance with relocation to a safe place, assistance in filing Personal Protection Orders (PPO's), assistance in filing for restitution, and assistance in filing Victim's Compensation Claims.

Tribal Police, Victim Services, and SORNA assist victims of crime with fairness, dignity and respect, and effectively ensure offenders are held accountable through the judicial services, while ensuring the rights of the accused are protected.

Tribal Fire/Rescue Department provides first response services to critical emergencies occurring in designated areas on Tribal land and Mutual Aid throughout the county.

The Sex Offender Registration and Notification Act is Title 1 of the Adam Walsh Child Protection and Safety Act of 2006. SORNA outlines mandatory minimum standards for sex offender registration and notification for all US jurisdictions, including states, federally recognized Tribes, and US territories. The purpose of this act is to help protect the public from sex offenders.

The duties of the Tribal Prosecutor are primarily spelled out in the Tribal Code at 3 GTBC § 104, which states:



The Tribal Prosecutor shall:

(1) be the chief law enforcement officer of the Tribe and shall be responsible for all criminal investigations and prosecutions in Tribal Court, including arraignments, motions, trials and appeals.

(2) have the discretion to prosecute violations of the Tribe's constitution, criminal code, ordinances and resolutions in Tribal Court.

(3) work closely with the Tribal Court Administrator and Tribal Judge to improve the delivery of services within the Tribal Court and to assist the Court in case management and docket preparation.

(4) serve as presenting officer in the Tribe's Children's Court and represent the Tribe in Indian Child Welfare cases in state jurisdictions upon the authorization of the ICW Committee or the Tribal Court.

(5) prosecute violations of the Tribe's fishing and conservation regulations as well as the regulations of the Chippewa-Ottawa Treaty Fishing Management Authority, in the Tribe's Conservation Court.

(6) establish a working relationship with local, state and federal jurisdictions and establish a protocol for coordinating criminal investigations and prosecutions with such local, state and federal jurisdictions.

(7) review all charges and complaints of violations of Tribal codes and ordinances and determine what charges to bring and whom to charge.

(8) review all requests for arrest warrants and search warrants to determine if all constitutional requirements are satisfied prior to approval or authorization.

(9) serve, in his/her civil capacity, as in-house counsel for the various departments of Tribal government and shall render legal opinions when requested to do so.

The Tribal Prosecutor may also give advice to Tribal members and employees and shall provide pro-bono services to Tribal elders or Tribal members who are having legal problems which may be related to their status as Native Americans. These services may only be provided as time permits and may not take priority over normal prosecutor duties.

The Tribal Prosecutor also provides up to 30 hours of time on an annual basis to perform duties for the Compensation Committee as needed in conjunction with their responsibilities as defined in 1 GTBC Chapter 4.

The Membership office offers services to applicants seeking to become members of the Grand Traverse Band of Ottawa and Chippewa Indians. These applications are evaluated and processed based on the criteria outlined in the Tribal Constitution, Article II, and the Enrollment Ordinance approved by Tribal Council, effective October 2, 2006. We also assist the Election Board. Additionally, we provide necessary data to all Tribal programs needing statistical data for applications and mailings. On a daily basis the staff makes updates to a database that manages data on member identification and vital statistics such as addresses and phone numbers.





This database is also used to generate mailing lists and labels as well as reports for other Tribal programs including the Tribal Newsletter. The database also stores the photographs and signatures of Tribal Members to provide Tribal IDs and it stores genealogical information. We also have improved our Tribal ID cards. The new cards have a holographic overlay and are more secure than the previous edition.

Other services offered through the Membership office include voter registration for Tribal elections and certifications for Michigan Indian Tuition Waiver Applications and Native American Employment Certifications. We also verify membership for Indian Child Welfare and Tribal Members who need CDIB's for other reasons.

To incorporate cultural teachings and ceremonies within the treatment modalities to foster optimum balance in the mental, emotional, physical and spiritual aspects of the whole person and their family. BHS is a CARF Accredited Outpatient Substance Abuse Program providing Culturally integrated clientcentered care by licensed and Certified Therapists.

BHS assists with outpatient & inpatient residential treatment referrals for substance use disorders and in the development of ongoing sober support to individuals upon their return to the community. A contractual Psychiatrist is available to provide medication management and psychiatric evaluations for adult clientele.



Income Guidelines:

Income guidelines are based on income from employment, fisheries income, odd jobs, and the like. Also, unearned income such as: unemployment, Social Security (disability and retirement), Per Capita, retirement pensions, child support and the like. Automatic qualifying incomes and Programs, TANF, SSI VA Pension/Retirement or Food stamps. One must be actively participating in these programs and provide official documentation. Households will be deemed eligible based on the income, based on household size. Household- all persons residing at one physical address, regardless of relationship. Households not participating in an automatic qualifying program, will be deemed eligible based on the household income, based on household size.

All patients under the age of 18 must be accompanied by a parent or guardian.

The Health Transporter cannot assist in any medical decision making or medical guidance on your behalf. In the event GTB Tribal offices are closed due to inclement weather, there will be no transportation provided. Unless previously arranged, transportation requests outside the six-county service area must be made well in advance, and in a timely fashion in order to complete the request and necessary paperwork.





The Grand Traverse Band Dental Clinic is located in the Medicine Lodge and provides dental exams, cleanings, x-rays, crowns, selective implant services, as well as a variety of other services and procedures.

*Emergency dental services are provided daily.

We currently have 4 dental operatories and are staffed with a full-time Chief Dentist, Dental Assistants, and Receptionist, and part-time Dentist and Hygienist. Current operational hours are 8AM-5PM M-F. New patient paperwork is available from our receptionist. Be sure to have your current address, telephone number, tribal ID, and insurance information. This assists in record keeping, billing, and check-in.

Purchased/Referred Care relies upon Federal and RAO dollars to support dental, medical, and optical services under the program, and serves eligible members in Antrim, Benzie, Charlevoix, Grand Traverse, Leelanau, and Manistee Counties.

Priority Levels of Service are established at the beginning of each fiscal year in order to provide that funds will be available for services most needed by membership. Services will be covered based on availability of funds. If funds deplete the priority will go to Emergency/Urgent Level. Descriptions of Priority Levels of Service for Medical, Dental, and Optical are available upon request, and posted in the GTB Newsletter, and other Government buildings. We regret we cannot provide all services to all members; we are limited in our resources.

When direct services cannot provide the necessary health care for our clients, PRC eligible clients are then referred to outside Providers for care and follow up. Clients are encouraged to continually update their information with the PRC office, to keep benefits active.

Failure to do so may result in denied claims. PRC operates on a pre-approval basis. Appointments must be called in 48 hours in advance so that prior-authorization can be entered for billing-processing. Actions outside this procedure may result in payment



denial. Appointments can be called in to the PRC Hotline anytime at (231) 534-7223, this line is checked daily.

Emergency services must be reported within 72 hours of incident. Elders have up to 30 days to notify PRC office. An emergency is defined as: Any medical condition for which immediate medical attention is necessary to prevent the death or serious impairment of an individual's health. With everyone's cooperation we can provide the help to those most in need of medical intervention. Please follow the procedures outlined so the system can operate smoothly for everyone.

Please keep your consent form updated yearly if you depend on someone to manage your medical affairs. Report all appointments on the hot line number listed. This ensures timely processing of billing and claims. For any questions or concerns please contact your PRC Representative for assistance.

Article V of the Grand Traverse Band Constitution established the Tribal Judiciary as a separate branch of government with authority to hear matters arising under the Tribal Constitution, ordinances, regulations and/or judicial decisions consistent with self-determination and the Tribe's sovereign powers. The Tribal Judiciary consists of the Tribal Court (with one (1) full time Chief Judge and one (1) part time Associate Judge) and the Tribal Appellate Court (with three (3) Appellate Judges).

The Tribal Court (trial level court) is a court of general jurisdiction and hears all civil, criminal, juvenile, traffic, child protection, minor trust, fishing/hunting, etc. The Tribal Appellate Court hears all appeals from the Tribal Court. The Tribal Judiciary meets every quarter and makes policy decisions concerning the adoption of court rules, policies, etc.

The Tribal Court is open Monday through Friday from 7:30 A.M. to 5:00 P.M. *(Open all day).* Cases may be heard after normal business hours to accommodate Tribal Member schedules upon request.

CTAS PA-3 DOMESTIC VIOLENCE COURT PROJECT - GRANT

The CTAS PA-3 Domestic Violence Court Project grant was awarded in Fiscal Year 2021. The goal of the grant is to strengthen the GTB Tribal Justice System by providing training, and to plan, create, implement and operate a specialty court for Domestic Violence crimes. The program focuses on a victim-centered approach to court cases, taking into consideration the needs and interests of victims of domestic violence during the court process. The program also focuses on reducing offender recidivism by using evidence-based practices for sentencing and probation.

SPECIAL DOMESTIC VIOLENCE CRIMINAL JURISDICTION (SDVCJ)

The Grand Traverse Band of Ottawa and Chippewa Indians (GTB) is an implementing tribe of SDVCJ. The SDVC] program seeks to implement and exercise returned jurisdiction and sentencing authority as enumerated in the 2013 reauthorization of the Violence Against Women Act (VAWA). The 2013 VAWA provisions recognize and reaffirm the inherent right of Tribal justice systems to prosecute crimes of domestic violence, dating violence, and certain violations of protection orders committed by all persons, including non-Native, against Native individuals on Tribal land. The SDVCJ Program funds an SDVCJ Public Defender to represent indigent defendants charged under SDVC] laws in Tribal Court. Program objectives include strengthening the GTB criminal justice system, ensuring victim rights, and holding perpetrators accountable.

PEACEMAKING - MNAWEEJEENDIWIN

Mnaweejeendiwin serves the physical, mental health, spiritual, emotional and educational wellbeing of Anishnaabek through development of traditional processes to resolve conflicts and promote a healthier lifestyle. Mnaweejeendiwin was established as an alternative to the "present" Tribal/State court system and applies traditional methods of conflict resolution and problem solving through consensus to build a stronger and healthier family community. Mnaweejeendiwin and clients are Tribal Members, members of other federally recognized tribes and non-Natives in our surrounding communities. Clients may seek the services of Mnaweejeendiwin on their own or may be referred by the Tribal Court. Mnaweejeendiwin services are primarily available in the six-county service area with limited services available outside the six-county service area contingent on Mnaweejeendiwin availability.

GRANTS TO INDIAN TRIBAL GOVERNMENTS PROGRAMS

The Grants to Indian Tribal Governments Programs (GITGP) was awarded to GTB in Fiscal Year 2023. This is a three-year grant. VAWA crimes include domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault, sex trafficking and stalking.

The program will provide a VAWA Intensive Probation Officer who is able to cover VAWA specific crimes.

The program will also provide a Tribal Court Survivor Liaison-Program Manager. This position is a systemsbased Victim Advocate for survivors of VAWA specific crimes stemming from GTB Tribal Court cases.

The program can provide civil legal representation for survivors of VAWA specific crimes.

Formed in 2019 after years of effort and coordination by tribal members, the Agriculture & Food Sovereignty Department is the vehicle by which The Grand Traverse Band of Ottawa and Chippewa Indians pursues the ambitious goal of establishing food sovereignty in the future. What does "Food Sovereignty" look like? In a bright future envisioned by the GTB councilors and members who worked to establish this new department, the Tribe is able to produce food and food products for the tribal community.





UTILIZING EXISTING AGRICULTURAL RESOURCES:

Over the 6 - County Service Area; Charlevoix, Antrim, Grand Traverse, Leelanau, Benzie, and Manistee, GTB has over 1,000+ acres of agricultural lands. These lands range from former apple orchard in Peshawbestown and near Turtle Creek Casino, to a former dairy farm adjacent to the GTB Charlevoix Satellite Office. These lands are valuable assets that can be put to use growing food and medicine for current members and future generations. Currently, the Agriculture and food Sovereignty Department is determining the "low hanging fruit", or most readily accessible lands, that can be worked into production.



ANNUAL SERVICES AND PRODUCTS OFFERED TO GTB COMMUNITY

- **GTB AGRICULTURAL WORKSHOPS:** We host a range of workshops throughout the year based on seasonal activities. This includes crop planting and harvest, sugar bush workshops, deer processing workshops, canning workshops and more. These activities are posted in the GTB Newsletter.
- ◊ GTB-MADE FARM PRODUCTS: Every year GTB Agriculture & Food Sovereignty Department distributes over \$12,000 in produce, fertilizer, meals, plant starts and seed. This is done at our workshops, GTB Health Fair, GTB Pow-Wow, and NRD Fair and Feast
- FOOD PREPARATION FOR GTB EVENTS: GTB Agriculture Staff have been tasked with cooking for many large GTB Events. This has included the MMIP Event, National Night Out, End of Summer Bash, and Fair and Feast. GTB Agriculture Staff have ServSafe Certification for Kitchen Management and Food Handling. This food preparation has included recipe cards and cooking instructions for meals to help incentivize healthy eating.
- ♦ GTB FOOD PANTRY FOOD PURCHASING: 2023-2025 GTB Agriculture has been the main supplier of food for the GTB Food Pantries after receiving over \$1.2 million in a USDA – Local Food Purchasing Grant. This grant has allowed GTB Food Pantries to receive all locally produced food. GTB has also provided food distribution contracts to a network of food pantries throughout the Grand Traverse Region, becoming a leader in providing for people in need. We partnered with several non-profits that specialize in purchasing and



distributing food. This has greatly increased the access to quality locally produced food in our region.

- **DISC GOLF COURSE MAINTENANCE:** With the proper equipment to help maintain the Strongheart Disc Golf Course, GTB Agriculture has helped to mow and maintain the current disc golf course since 2020.
- **COMMUNITY INFRASTRUCTURE:** Over the past year we have built 4 new pavilions for the GTB community. 1 at the Peshawbestown Farm, 1 at the Strongheart Center, 1 at the GTB Sugar Bush, and 1 at the Benzie Satellite Office. These structures are open for community use and will be used to host programing.
- AGRICULTURAL PLANNING ٥ AND GRANT **WRITING:** Much of the growth in the Agriculture Department is spurred by grant funding. This has meant that the Department grows in the direction of successfully received grants. We continue to gather input from the tribal community via survey data and from GTB Tribal Council via Work Sessions to help shape the direction of the program. Potential future areas of growth include: bison herd management, orchard management, sugar bush expansion, and building a commercial kitchen for community food processing.

LEGAL REPRESENTATION

The Tribal Council is the client of the GTB Legal Department. The Legal Department strives to provide professional, competent, comprehensive and timely services in all matters related to the client's constitutional functions as the executive and legislative branches of the GTB government. The legal services provided include: legal representation in disputes involving GTB, drafting legislation and providing professional advice related to the programmatic functions and interactions of the GTB tribal government between the various departments of GTB, as well as with its tribal citizens, and the tribal government's relationship and coordination with the federal, state, and local governments.

2% PROGRAM

The 2% program is the result of the Consent Decree, which settled Tribes v. Engler (Case No. 1:90-CV-611,U.S. District Court, Western District Michigan). With this settlement, the Grand Traverse Band agreed to pay 2% of its video gaming revenue to local units of government, as defined in the stipulation, no later than 60 days after October 1st and March 31st of each year. This payment schedule was modified with the consent of the State of Michigan to July 31st and January 31st of each year because the fiscal year of the GTB's gaming operations is calendar-based. Local units of government applying for 2% grants are provided copies of the 2% Guidelines and 2% application, both of which were approved by Tribal Council. Since the 2 percent allocation began in 1994, the Grand Traverse Band has allocated \$46,967,135.79 to local organizations.

The Land & Roads Management office is charged with overseeing many issues related to GTB's land acquisitions, property management, fee-to-trust matters, transportation planning, road maintenance, road construction, residential tribal lots for members and mapping of GTB properties.

This office maintains files for the Tribe's 2,981 acres of land of which 1,673 acres are in Trust with the USA for GTB. Over the last 20 years the Tribe's Roads program has received over 64 million dollars through the BIA Tribal Transportation Program to build new roads and improve existing roads. This funding has been used to construct several Tribal residential roads and sidewalks and streetlighting. It also has been used for constructing Government, EDC and GT Resort roads, sidewalks and parking lots. A portion of this funding has allowed the Tribe to Co-Op projects with local County Road Commissions and MDOT to reconstruct county and state roads that serve the GTB population throughout the six county service area.
