What Is Sextortion?

Sextortion describes a crime that happens online when an adult convinces a person who is younger than 18 to share sexual pictures or perform sexual acts on a webcam. If young people are being exploited, they are the victim of a crime and should report it to the proper authorities. If you are a victim of cell phone fraud or being Sextorted know that the situation can feel very confusing and the criminals count on you feeling too unsure, scared, or embarrassed to tell someone this is happening.

How To Talk To My Teen?

Try using media stories to engage in this conversation with your teen and to discuss the risks & what could have been done differently. Reassure your teen that if they end up in a problem situation, you are there to help. Tell them you are sorry this is happening to them and that you want to help. Let them know that they are the victim of a crime and have not done anything wrong.

Encourage them to ask for help and see if you can help them identify a trusted adult to tell.
